Many of our patients have suffered traumatic injury, such as motor vehicle accident, diving accidents or workplace injury. Others suffer from conditions such as brain stem strokes, MS or ALS.

Most of our patients were once just like you or I, until tragedy hit. The worst part is that once these patients needed support the most their family and friends and in many ways society, abandoned them.

Some of our patients remain in the hospital as complex care patients for decades with out visitors or support.



What we do?

The Angel Project was founded by Lisette Kingo in 2008, due to the lack of support for patients in Complex care hospitals across Ontario.

We give patients a voice back and most of all their dignity by supplying necessary everyday items such as shampoo, soap and shaving cream. We make sure each patient knows that they are not forgotten by the world and that there is someone out there who cares.



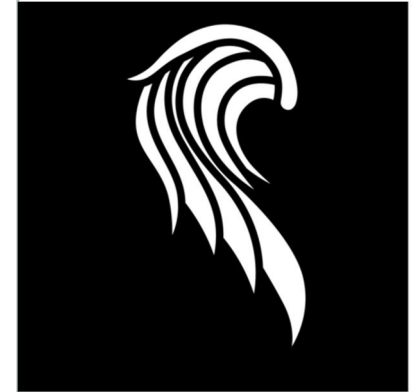

We pride ourselves on operating with minimal overhead. We are strictly volunteer based.

We have provided hospitals and patients with much needed equipment such as customized wheel chairs, smart boards, computers and perhaps our most important contribution is to provide Ipads with retina displays and computer speaking devices which give patients their voice back. Not only are they paralyzed and left to fend for them selves but with no voice. Your donation can help give patients their voice back.

Customized wheelchairs do not only provide mobility, but also helps prevent bedsores. Bedsores is one of the leading causes of death among our patients.

We also provide equipment to aid in

rehabilitation, movement and more.

In addition to funding major equipment we also fund several outing per year. Many of these people have not been able to leave the hospital in months or even years. We facilitate outings to concerts, the park and even a hockey game.

We also ensure that each patient received a holiday gift. Christmas is often the hardest time of year to be alone and ill. Patients are able to submit a wish list to us and we do our best to fulfill it. Most requests are very simple such as a personal blanket or a soft pillow.

Complex care patients are too ill to be moved to long term care homes, hence remain in limbo in a system which has failed them. We are their only voice.

We advocate change and we are the voice of our patients while giving them a sense of humanity.
